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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The FamilieSCN2A Foundation, Inc. (Foundation) (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2025 and 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Foundation as of December 31, 2025 and 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Foundation and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Foundation's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities – The FamilieSCN2A Foundation, Inc. (Foundation) was incorporated under the laws of the State of Massachusetts as a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit in 2015. Its primary mission is to improve the lives of those affected by SCN2A-related disorders through research, public awareness, family support and patient advocacy.

The Foundation’s goal is to find effective treatments and ultimately a cure for SCN2A-related autism and epilepsy disorders. The Foundation raises public awareness, provides patient advocacy and supports clinical research, genetic research and early detection.

Basis of Accounting – The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and, accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Basis of Presentation – The Foundation presents its financial statements in accordance with the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC). Under the FASB ASC, the Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and changes in financial position activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

Net assets without donor restrictions: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions or the donor-imposed restrictions have been fulfilled.

Net assets with donor restrictions: Net assets subject to stipulations imposed by donors and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions will be met by actions of the Foundation or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, whereby the donor has stipulated the funds be maintained in perpetuity.

Tax-Exempt Status – The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 501(c)(3) and related state code sections. In addition, the Foundation does not have any income which it believes would subject it to unrelated business income taxes. Accordingly, there is no provision for income taxes in the accompanying financial statements. Management of the Foundation has processes presently in place to ensure the maintenance of its tax exempt statuses; to identify and report unrelated business income; to determine filing and tax obligations for which it has nexus; and to identify and evaluate other matters that may be considered tax positions. Management of the Foundation has evaluated its tax positions and related income tax contingencies and does not believe that any material uncertain tax positions exist that require recognition or disclosure in the financial statements. The Foundation is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions for a period of 3 to 5 years; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents – Cash and cash equivalents include highly-liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Contributions Receivable – Contributions receivable are recorded as unconditional pledges at their fair market value on the date the pledge is made. The Foundation considers the contributions receivable fully collectible and expects all amounts to be collected within one year of the statement of financial position date. Therefore, no allowance for doubtful accounts or present value discount have historically been determined necessary by management.

Conference Receivables – Conference receivables represents unpaid amounts for the annual summer conference are stated at the amounts management expects to collect. Management reviews these receivables and recognizes an expected allowance for credit losses. The allowance is derived from a review of the Foundation’s historical losses based on expectations of future collectability. The Foundation considers these receivables to be collectible in full. Opening balances of conference receivables for the periods ended December 31, 2025 and 2024 were \$11,400 and \$0, respectively.

Grant Expenses and Refundable Advances – Grant expense is recognized in the period the grant is countersigned, provided the grant is not subject to future Foundation-imposed conditions. Conditional grants are recognized as grant expense and as a grant payable in the period in which the grantee meets the terms of the conditions. The Foundation awarded \$906,255 and \$409,854 in 2025 and 2024, respectively, in grant awards, the majority of which are conditioned on the grantees conducting certain research activities. The net amount of the disbursed awards and awards that have not yet met recognition criteria for grant expenses is recorded as a refundable advance, totaling \$271,461 and \$222,514 at December 31, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

In-kind Contributions – Donated marketable securities and other noncash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Donated services are recognized as contributions in accordance with the FASB ASC, if the services create or enhance nonfinancial assets or require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Foundation.

Revenue Recognition – Contribution revenues are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions unless use of the related assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. When the restriction is finally met on a contribution received in a prior year, the amount is shown as a reclassification of net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions. Expenses that release restrictions are reported as decreases in net assets without donor restrictions. Gains and losses on assets and liabilities are reported as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions unless their use is restricted by explicit donor restriction or by law.

Revenue is recognized when earned. Conference fees are recognized when the conference is held, and conference fees received in advance are deferred to the applicable period in which the conference is held. Contributions are recognized when cash, securities or other assets, an unconditional promise to give, or notification of a beneficial interest is received. Conditional promises to give, that is, those with a measurable performance or other barrier, and a right of return, are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met.

Advertising – The Foundation expenses all advertising costs as they are incurred.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Functional Allocation of Expenses – The costs of providing the Foundation’s various program and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the accompanying statement of activities. The majority of expenses are directly charged to a specific function based on the nature of the expense; however, certain shared expenses, such as salaries and related, accounting, travel and meetings, marketing, bank charges and credit card fees, postage and shipping, and staff development are allocated between the program and supporting services benefited based on management’s best estimate of time spent by function.

Reclassifications – Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2024 financial statements to conform to the 2025 presentation.

Date of Management’s Review – Subsequent events have been evaluated through May 12, 2026, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2. INFORMATION REGARDING LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY

The Foundation receives contributions, conference revenue, and investment return, and considers contributions restricted for programs which are ongoing, major, and central to its operations to be available to meet cash needs for general expenditures. The Foundation manages its liquidity and reserves following three guiding principles: operating within a prudent range of financial soundness and stability, maintaining adequate liquid assets to fund near-term operating needs, and maintaining sufficient reserves to provide reasonable assurance that long-term obligations will be discharged. NOTE 3. INVESTMENTS AND FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

In accordance with FASB ASC, the following are quantitative disclosures about the fair value measurements of assets and liabilities. Fair value measurements are categorized on three levels:

Level 1: Quoted prices in active market for identical securities. Investments in fixed income securities and publicly traded securities with active markets are valued as Level 1.

Level 2: Other significant observable inputs (including quoted prices for similar securities, interest rates, repayment spreads, credit risk, etc.).

NOTE 3. INVESTMENTS AND FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Level 3: Quantitative unobservable inputs are third party pricing information without adjustment. In August 2025, the Foundation received a contribution of 1,600,000 shares of common stock. The contribution was subject to a restrictive agreement, with shares being released for sale in five equal tranches of 320,000 shares every two months, beginning in October 2025, and ending in June 2026.

Under ASC 820, fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset in an orderly transaction between market participants. While this common stock is traded on the NASDAQ, the Foundation determined that the quoted market price on the date of contribution and at year-end did not represent fair value due to the following factors:

- Market thinness: The total contribution represented a significant percentage of the outstanding shares, far exceeding the average daily trading volume.
- Transfer restrictions: Contractual restrictions limit the Foundation’s ability to liquidate its position in the open market.
- Price volatility: Significant price fluctuations resulting from a localized shareholder dispute rather than company financial performance.

Consequently, the Foundation utilized a Level 3 valuation technique to determine fair value at year-end. For shares sold prior to December 31, 2025, fair value was determined by actual transaction proceeds. For the remaining 1,400,000 shares held at December 31, 2025, the Foundation estimated fair value at \$0.33 per share by applying a historical price-to-liquidation value ratio of 79% to the common stock's adjusted net current asset value (liquidation value) per share.

The inputs and methodology used for valuing the Foundation’s financial assets and liabilities are not indicators of the risks associated with those instruments. NOTE 5. CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Foundation has concentrated its custodial credit risk by maintaining deposits in financial institutions which at most times exceed amounts covered by insurance provided by the U.S. Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). The loss would represent the excess of the deposit liabilities reported by the banks over the amounts that would have been covered by federal insurance. The Foundation has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk to cash.

NOTE 6. IN-KIND CONTRIBUTIONS

Donated stipends and donated expense reimbursements were valued at the amount due to respective parties, and donated back to the Foundation. Donated stock was valued at estimated fair value on the date of donation (see Note 3). Donated accounting services were valued at the estimated cost the Foundation would pay to receive similar services.

NOTE 7. CONDITIONAL PROMISES TO GIVE

In February 2024, the Foundation received a conditional promise to give for \$1,500,000 for annual conference support and annually awarded action potential grants. The funding is conditioned on the annual conference occurring and the action potential grants being awarded at no more than \$500,000 per year through 2026. In both years ended December 31, 2025 and 2024, the Foundation has recorded contribution revenue of \$500,000, respectively, in relation to this agreement.

In January 2025, the Foundation received a conditional promise to give for \$359,854 to support research at a specific university and is conditioned on milestones of the research. During the year ended December 31, 2025, \$261,205 was recorded as contribution revenue in relation to this agreement.

NOTE 8. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

During 2025, board members, committee members, and employees contributed \$1,064,087, which represents approximately 81% of contribution revenue and approximately 46% of total revenue in 2025. During the year ended December 31, 2024, board members, committee members, and employees contributed \$2,553,727, which represents approximately 88% of contribution revenue and approximately 82% of total revenue in 2024.

NOTE 9. COMMITMENTS

In January 2025, the Foundation entered into a drug repurposing evaluation contract with a vendor requiring payments as the scope of work progresses on the contract and as deliverables are provided. As of December 31, 2025, \$80,000 is remaining to be paid on the current scope of work, which is payable upon completion of the work package.

NOTE 10. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent to December 31, 2025, the Foundation experienced significant market volatility in the market value of one of its investment portfolios. As of the date these financial statements were available to be issued, the Foundation had sold an additional 980,000 shares of the stock and held 420,000 remaining shares. The fair value of this holding has continued to change significantly relative to its reported value at year-end driven by volatility in one of this portfolio's stock holdings.

As these changes in value occurred after the balance sheet date, no adjustment has been made to the financial statements as of December 31, 2025.
